

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DID YOU SEE??????????

Did you see Monsters of the Deep in October? No not Blue Planet 2. This was a month before that and the programme I watched showed dolphins in shallow bays slapping the sand bottom with their tails to disturb silt and reduce visibility. This is clever on its own but they do this and create a silt wall in a "v/" shape so that when the tide recedes the fish travelling out with the tide swim into the "v" and seek to escape. Their method of escape is to swim to the surface and leap out of the water over "the wall" of silt.

The only down side of this escape is that the dolphins are on the surface on the opposite side of the wall with their mouths wide open.

And if you think that is clever, there were several dolphins each creating their own silt wall side by side across the full width of the bay.

Also on the same programme there were groups of humpback whales co-operating with each other and creating large circles of bubbles whilst a member of their group below their target emits a whistle at 180 decibels which drives the herring to the surface within the bubble circle. The whales then feed on the "trapped" herring eating up to half a ton in a day EACH. Remember they typically weigh 25 – 30 metric tonnes.

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Marine Conservation Society Beach Clean – September 16th 2017

It was quite a sunny day, when Jay Scott and Lynne Bunker met up with 15 other volunteers at the Salcombe Harbour Office for a briefing, and task allocation, as we were to take part in our first Beach Clean.



It was to be Scoble Beach, which we were a little puzzled by it's location, but a short launch later and we were being landed (in some cases quite unceremoniously) onto some quite slippery rocks, more or less adjacent to Whitestrand. After about 10 minutes of careful progress we arrived on the beach area and split off into our groups. Jay disappeared off into the distance busy finding batteries etc, whilst I had the sometimes complex task of cataloguing the finds of my group. We were all surprised at how many categories were available, which became more evident as to why when we saw the summaries. We were all absolutely shocked by how much plastics we found, and in this case parts of water balloons which had been the result of the town regatta, and indeed, the evidence we found has been used to try to influence next year's. Unfortunately, British weather being just that, it started to rain, and we all started to get cold, but it was as we had finished, so another 10 minutes of slippery rocks and journey back, we went with vouchers in hand, for hot drinks at Salcombe Coffee. MEMBERSHIP FEES 2017

To the Stratford Branch, all Members pay an annual subscription of £120 towards costs of the Branch.

To BSAC, Members pay an annual subscription of £57.50 that covers BSAC costs, their monthly '*Scuba*' magazine and their third party insurance. Both of the above are due on the 1st April each year.

New members are required to pay a full annual subscription for both of the above when they join. In their second year they pay pro-rata to bring them to the next 1st April.

Hire of kit for a new trainee is £60 for a period of for five months.

Thereafter it is £45 for 3 months.

Pool Sessions - £3 for all Members **Try a Dive** £20 a session.

Training Books vary but typically the cost for an Ocean Diver is £60 which includes Sports Diver Books.

The Club has 2 boats (RIB's) and the Committee believes that Members should contribute towards the cost of running these boats in proportion to how often they dive from them. This is paid for by a compulsory Annual Boat Levy of £30 payable along with your Annual Subscription by all Members in their second year onwards If you do minimal diving from the Club boats during the year you will receive a full or part refund of your Boat Levy. Non members diving from Club RIBs will pay £10 per dive.

Members towing RIB's get 50% of the fuel price e.g.60 pence per mile.

CLUB DIVING STANDARDS

All Members are expected to dive in accordance with the guidelines of the BSAC as published from time to time.

No dives should be organised without the prior approval of the Diving Officer who will provide you with a Diving Log which is to be completed with details of the dive and returned to him.

On the reverse side of the Diving Log is a list of the main BSAC guidelines that the Committee wishes to emphasise at this time.

You are reminded that the depth limits for qualified divers is as follows:

Ocean Divers – 20 metres

Sports Divers – 35 metres

All other qualified divers -50 metres

Members who ignore any of these guidelines do so entirely at their own risk.

You are also reminded of the following:

- Members are strongly recommended to use Delayed Surface Marker Buoys which can be filled by means other than purged air from a mouthpiece.
- Sports Divers and above are recommended to carry their own independent source of back-up air in a second cylinder (twin or pony)

These extracts are not exhaustive and so if you have any queries you should clear these with the Diving Officer before diving.
